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considers how public policy may foster sustainable economic development among marginalized groups through more complete integration into market economies, as workers and entrepreneurs, or through alternative models that emphasize economic self-termination and self-governance through community economic development.

Provides students with the basic core competencies and practical skills required of a 'generalist' or 'integrative' development practitioner and serves as the foundation course for the Master's in Development Practice curriculum.

Helps students gain insights into the core concepts of sustainable development, global sustainability, earth stewardship, and self-termination through indigenous perspectives.

Considers how economic theory improves the understanding of issues facing developing communities and analyses the policy instruments for ensuring that economic development is more environmentally sustainable
